Alternative Fueled Vehicles and New Vehicle Technology

This course provides information about the hazards of the alternate fuels, such as methanol, compressed natural gas, and electric power, the pressures created within fuel cylinders, as well as safety information on other hazards that may be present at incidents involving an alternative fueled vehicle. The second portion of the program deals with the changing technology of the automobile. Intended to provide new information for those students who may have completed Accident Victim Extrication Training (AVET) in the past and have a need to update information about changes to the newer vehicles.

Ground Ladders-Applications on the Fire Ground

This program covers placing and utilizing ladders as a fundamental skill for all firefighters. More importantly, ground ladders are a vital tool on the fire ground, especially for departments without a dedicated truck company. Properly placed ground ladders are an important element to safe fire operations, they help to make tactical operations easier, and may prove to be a life saving tool. This class is intended to provide firefighters with a quick refresher on ground ladder operations. Additionally, new and aggressive ladder skills will be presented for those that must work shorthanded, and for those with limited exposure and experience with ground ladders.
